Land Acknowledgement

LGBT YouthLine works in the place often referred to as Ontario, which continues to be colonized land, and is home to many Indigenous communities. Our head office, in Tkaronto (Toronto), is the territory of the Anishinaabe, Haudenosaunee, Wendat and Petun First Nations, the Seneca, and most recently, the Mississaugas of the Credit River. Today, the meeting place of Tkaronto remains home to many Indigenous peoples across Turtle Island. YouthLine works in this community, in this context, on this territory.

Our Mission

LGBT YouthLine is a 2SLGBTQ+ youth-led organization that affirms and supports the experiences of youth (29 and under) across Ontario. We do this by:

- Providing anonymous peer support and referrals;
- Training youth to provide support to other youth; and
- Providing resources so youth can make informed decisions.

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Letter from Interim ED and Board Co-Chairs

For nearly three decades, LGBT YouthLine's work has centered around affirming, supporting, and providing community for 2SLGBTQ+ youth across Ontario. As we look forward to what the next year holds, we are privileged and excited to be celebrating 30 years of providing confidential and anonymous peer support to queer youth in Ontario.

Pride Every Day, Every Way

With the enduring support of our community members, donors, partners, and friends, YouthLine has remained responsive in the face of change. It is because of our dedicated staff and volunteers that we continue to provide peer support to thousands of youth across Ontario, year after year. This past year, we were happy to return to even more in-person events, even at a time when we continued to see an increase in anti-Trans rhetoric and the co-optation of our communities. YouthLine is a refuge from that environment and provides a judgement-free space for youth to explore and celebrate their identities — and we are committed to being here for 2SLGBTQ+ youth as long as they need us. Our Pride 2022 campaign, 'Pride every day, every way,' was a celebration of everyone's unique ways of celebrating their identities, growth, and communities. Pride is a reminder of the work generations before have put in, the challenges our communities face today, and how much further we have to go.

Recognizing Past Leaders

This summer, Taashi Gupta departed YouthLine after many years as Executive Director. They joined YouthLine in 2016 and were a key figure in shaping YouthLine through an era of growth to where it stands today. Taashi spearheaded initiatives like the Provincial Youth Ambassador Project, YouthOrganize, and a remote peer support delivery model during the early days of COVID-19. They leave a deep legacy at YouthLine, and we continue to learn and grow from their contributions while wishing them the best in their future endeavors.



Welcoming New Leadership

In March 2023, we welcomed Lauren Pragg (they/them) to YouthLine as our Interim Executive Director. Lauren was a previous YouthLine staff member who returned to us at a time of significant change for the organization. Their leadership has been critical to stabilizing our organization and future planning as we completed our organizational review and started implementing key recommendations. We continue to rely on their leadership as we look at ways to celebrate 30 years of LGBT YouthLine and to focus more intentionally on embedding our values of anti-racism, anti-oppression and equity into all aspects of the organization. We are incredibly grateful to Lauren for their continued advocacy for our community's best interests and dedication to supporting queer youth across the province.

Turning 30

We are deeply grateful for every member of the organization who continues to show up each and every day to support our communities. And we are thankful to all of you reading this report for your continued support – whether that has been through hosting fundraising events on our behalf, contributing a monthly donation, giving your time to our organization, meeting with us at in-person events, or engaging with us across social media. 
Taking a Step Back from Phone Services

Feedback from our volunteers and community members has been invaluable in helping us discern the most effective means of support. We've observed a significant surge in the demand for text and chat-based services, reflecting changes in how 2SLGBTQ+ youth engage with our services and the world, as well as challenges posed by remote work and the pandemic.


As a result, we've decided to suspend our phone services indefinitely to allocate our attention and resources towards providing high-quality support through the most accessible mediums.





Training & Online Learning

The Online Learning Project was initiated to revamp and modernize our Peer Support HelpLine training to better suit an online environment for volunteers, to create needed resources for HelpLine volunteers on shift, and to support the development of training modules for staff and board.

Leading up to April 2022, the Learning Management System (LMS) Auzmor was selected and a dedicated staff worked on planning out the Online Learning Project.






Spring 2022, two dedicated Online Learning Coordinators led the Online Learning Project. Topic experts were consulted to write content for major Peer Support training themes (some of whom are YouthLine alumni as well!). Online Learning Coordinators translated the content onto Auzmor.

In **Summer 2022**, we rolled out our first-ever hybrid training cycle incorporating six new modules on the new Learning Management System (LMS) Auzmor alongside Zoom trainings. The first 6 module topics were as follows: Introduction to YouthLine and Peer Support; Gender, Sexuality, and Coming out; Anti-Oppression and Anti-Racism; Settler Colonialism; Trans Health; and Harm Reduction.

By March 2023, the development and editing of all 11 training modules on Auzmor had completed. These modules were called: Mental Health and Crisis; Abuse, Boundaries and Duty to Report; Religion, Sexual Health and Vicarious Trauma; Abuse, Disability Justice, Relationships and Identity; HelpLine Technology.



Auzmor has uniquely allowed incorporation of multimedia and interactive training content, including videos, text, audio, and virtual knowledge check activities, into modules used in training. The new training format on Auzmor includes updated training content, links to additional sources, and resources from guest contributors.

Looking forward with Auzmor

The feedback received on the Auzmor modules has been overall positive, and we are looking forward to continue the work of keeping up-to-date on best practices and accessibility of training. Our next steps include:

Collect data and evaluate

Continue to track the impact of our training and evaluate the newest training model.

Update and experiment with curriculum

Continue to update content based on emerging best practices and knowledge, and develop new curriculum as volunteer trainee and staff feedback.

Optimize modules

Improve upon the learning accessibility of our trainings by creating more video content, and ensure trainings are short and succinct.

Iterate and adapt

Adapt the principles and content in our training to other program areas for volunteers, YL staff and board. We also hope one day these trainings might be used for diverse youth communities across Ontario.



Volunteer Feedback Highlights

We had a high rate of completion of the feedback forms with this training cohort, with an average of 15 responses per module for the first 6 modules.

On average, trainees reported an increase in comfortability after each module of about 2 points on a 10-point scale from 6.5, to 8.5

Trainees gave positive feedback on the scenario sessions, rating them a 9 out of 10 on average. Overall average rating of the week's training was 4.7 out of 5 stars.

The vast majority of volunteer responded "Agree" or "Strongly agree" to the statements:

- This week's module was interesting or engaging.
- This week's module was accessible for my learning.
- This week's content felt relevant to volunteering on the peer support line.

Our 2SLGBTQ+ Youth Leadership Programs offer youth opportunities to strengthen leadership skills, access important social supports, and increase community capacity.




YouthOrganize (YO) brings together 2SLGBTQ+ youth within Peel, Halton, and surrounding regions to host 2SLGBTQ+ programming, strengthen leadership skills, and build community through artbased opportunities and projects.

The Provincial Youth Ambassador Project (PYAP) developed projects with 2SLGBTQ+ youth cohorts from across Ontario with the goal to increase 2SLGBTQ+ programming and supports in their local regions. PYAP strove towards building communities that are not only safer and inclusive of 2SLGBTQ+ youth, but also free from systemic barriers and violence.





YouthOrganize (YO) offered a diverse range of arts-based workshop series this year, each centered around specific artistic mediums and themes related to queer identities and personal growth.


These workshops, conducted by YO and local artists, served as a platform for nurturing creativity, community building, and self-expression.

Among these workshops, "Writing the Rituals of a Queer Self," facilitated by The Wild Woman (Lamoi Simmons), was a highlight. Through a blend of personal experiences, queer identities, and creative writing, participants embarked on a journey of self-discovery, developing a more confident and authentic queer self. The workshop incorporated exercises designed to amplify the power of one's voice through lived experiences, expressed eloquently through the art of poetry.







Program Highlight: PYAP Podcast Series

Created by and for 2SLGBTQ+ youth, the podcast series included compelling interviews, candid conversations, and even a fictional series! The goal was to capture all the things that are on the minds of 2SLGBTQ+ youth.



We are proud to have completed 10 episodes in the podcast series! You can find them on **Spotify** by searching **LGBT YouthLine**.

From its inception to the end of PYAP, 67 youth completed 120 hours of volunteer service each. Across all 4 years, Youth Ambassadors were given the opportunity to participate in meaningful volunteer experiences. From podcasts and videos to zines and affirmation decks, to recommendations reports and needs assessments, Youth Ambassadors were able to participate in ways that interested and engaged them. PYAP created important resources, made meaningful connections with community partners/organizations, and most importantly, built community and leadership amongst 2SLGBTQ+ youth throughout Ontario.



Pride Every Day, Every Way

Given the return of in-person Pride events and the messaging of Pride being "back" after two years, we developed this year's theme by thinking about how people celebrate Pride.



We wanted to name that everyone has different ways, big and small, of celebrating their identities, growth, and communities. Each tradition is personal and important. We also wanted to recognize **Pride celebrations that exist outside the month of June**, and remind people that **YouthLine supports 2SLGBTQ+youth year-round**.

One of YouthLine's own traditions is to have a table at the Toronto Trans March & Community Fair, which allows us to spread awareness about the HelpLine, and meet some of our volunteers and staff in person--always an exciting time, especially now with our virtual workplace!



Third Party Pride Fundraisers

Our annual Pride campaign raised \$41,669.11 from 153 donors! As always, we were floored by the outpouring of generosity and love from our community, both in Ontario and across Canada.

During Pride, we like to highlight our Third-Party Fundraisers! From GSAs running school bakesales, to homegoods stores donating a portion of their proceeds, to individuals selling handmade crafts—each year we see many forms of support and Pride unfold during the summer months.

In 2022, 31 Third-Party Fundraisers donated a total of \$17,738.25 to YouthLine! That's about half of total funds raised!



Our Infrastructure Keeps Growing!

Our team works hard to keep our logistics and communications moving and improving. In 2022, we continued to document, create, and update internal procedures, especially around outreach tabling at Pride.

The biggest point of growth and excitement, however, was the hiring of YouthLine's first Finance Manager! Tyler has been an invaluable member of the team since he started in July 2022. He improved documentation and collaboration around finance processes, spearheaded the implementation of a Staff Wellness Budget, and delivered teachings on the Treaty system(s) in Canada as part of National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.

Organizational Review

Over the last few years, LGBT YouthLine has undergone significant changes and expansions to programming that have developed youth resilience and created space for the celebration of 2SLGBTQ+ youth across Ontario. The Board of Directors recognized that sustainably moving forward into YouthLine's 30th year of operations required a fulsome organizational review to determine the impact of these changes on YouthLine.

This review, led by Mercedes Lee and Marisa Tran, was a massive undertaking that would not have been possible without the valuable input of YouthLine's staff and management.

With this review, we are excited to work together to usher in a new era for YouthLine!

Communications Strategy with Grassriots Incorporated

We want to express our gratitude to Grassriots Inc. who supported the improvement and growth of our communications and social media strategy. Through this partnership, we were able to take an intentional look at our messaging, and how we can support and affirm youth through our communication channels. Through the decades, YouthLine has grown to be a place where 2SLGBTQ+ youth across Ontario can find support and a space to build their own sense of community.




